# Tips For A Successful Parent Teacher Night

With Parent Teacher Conferences in our view it is important to hit all key points as it may be the first time you are meeting all of your child's teachers. The following points should help your conferences run smoothly.

- Before attending the conference, experts recommend first getting the student's input. What is it they perceive as an issue; what is it they like best about class; what is it they like least, are potential questions to ask. Is there anything in particular they want you to tell the teacher?
- List topics or questions to discuss about the child's behavior, academics, or anything else.
- At the conference, parents should tell teachers if the student has medical issues or gets bullied. Teachers should also be aware of "emotional upheavals the child may be dealing with, such as divorce or the death of a loved one
- If parents are sensitive to something the teacher says about the student, don't get angry, [and] don't get defensive. If the teacher presents something, rather than acting immediately, ask questions [and] ask for examples.
- 5. Before heading home, parents should let teachers know the best way to be contacted. The relationship should extend beyond the parent-teacher conference and last throughout the year, Your child's teacher should understand that they can always come to you with a concern.

### CollegeBoard.org will be an integral part of your child's Junior and Senior year. Below you will find a few tips to get the ball rolling starting in the spring of their junior year.

- Search together for colleges that meet your child's needs. Once you have an idea of the qualities your child is looking for in a college, help him or her enter these criteria into the college search on Collegeboard.org to create a list of colleges to consider applving to.
- Help your child research scholarships. This form of financial aid provides money for college that doesn't need to be repaid. Learn more through College Board's "Scholarship Search" page.
- Attend college fairs and financial aid events. These events allow you to meet with college representatives and get answers to questions. Your child can ask the school counselor how to find events in your area. Check out the College Fair Checklist for more information.
- Help your child make summer plans. Summer is a great time to explore interests and learn new skills and colleges look for students who pursue meaningful summer activities. Help your high schooler look into summer learning programs or find a job or internship.
- Visit colleges together. Make plans to check out the campuses of colleges your child is interested in. Use the "Campus Visit Checklist" to learn how to get the most out of these experiences.
